From The First Vice District Governor

My Fellow Lions:

It has now been three months since our District Convention in Del Rio and a month since our International Convention in Seattle, Washington, and more recently our First Cabinet Meeting in Pleasanton, TX.

I want to thank my Home Club, the San Antonio Edgewood Lions Club, for their sponsorship and support as well as District 2-A2 for your continual support and encouragement in my new role as your First Vice District Governor.

At our recent International Convention, our new President, Lion Wing-Kun Tam urged clubs to be Family-like. President Tam "Believes that one person can

Another hat that I wear as your First VDG, is co-chair of the "Stride for Sight." At this time of year, most Clubs are putting together their budgets, and I would like to encourage your club to con-

sider the Marion Jones "Stride for Sight" Program which supports the Lions Low Vision Center of Texas, the Eberlin Research Center and the Clinical Skills Lab. I have recently met with the Board for the Lions Sight Research Foundation (LSRF) about talking to clubs about how important this program is to our District. The Low Vision Center is in the process of expanding on their space. As a result, the UT Health Science Center has hired an additional physician to help Dr. Sandy Fox. The Low Vision Center will be able to see more patients and provide more services to the community. The Department of Ophthalmology is one of five Departments within the Medical School, but it has the Lions signature throughout. This effort is truly in keeping with the Lions commitment to Helen Keller when she asked the Lions in 1925, at the International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio, to become "Knights for the Blind."

As always, as I continue to visit Lions Clubs in the District and I hope to learn more about you and your club and ways that I can give you my full support. Again, if I can be of service to you or your club, please let me know.

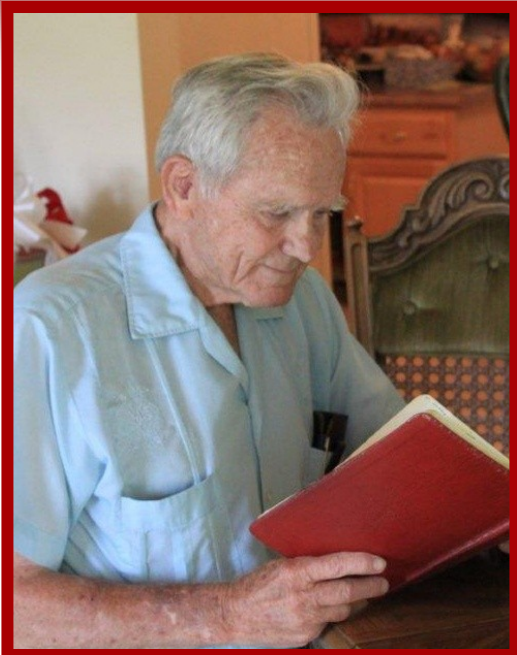

From Texas Lions Foundation: The Impossible Dream Really Isn't

To dream the impossible dream.

Boy, I really don't know where the time has gone. It seems like I was just starting my time as a trustee of the Texas Lions Foundation, and now I am starting my fifth and final year as a trustee. By constitutional requirements, at the end of this year I must take at least a one-year break as a trustee. I can still stay on the Board, but only as an elected officer, not as a trustee. If someone would be interested in becoming a trustee, please let 1st VDG Richard know, as he will have to appoint the next trustee to a two-year term.

Your Foundation stayed very busy the last half of the Lions year as we had more requests for grants than usual. We had a couple of floods in east Texas and several large fires in north, central, and west Texas. Add in a couple of extra projects, and we spent more money than usual. Of course, that is what the money is for, and I remain committed to "Texas Lions Helping Texans."

As for District 2A2, this past year was good, but not great. As it was

with every organization, donations were down. In contributions we ranked 3rd among the 16 districts in Texas. District 2T3 won this year by having one club donate \$10,000, beating 2A2 by \$2,800. I



am still extremely proud of this district and its contributions over the past four years. Approximately \$77,000 has been raised during that time, which brings me to the part of dreaming the impossible dream. When I was a young, naïve trustee, just beginning my work

with the Foundation, I had the dream of \$100,000 in donations over a five-year period. I knew that most districts couldn't raise one-half that amount for the same time frame. But it doesn't cost anything to "dream the impossible dream." It still won't be easy to achieve that goal, but you never know unless you try.

Therefore, I am asking clubs NOW to make a place in your club's budget for the Texas Lions Foundation, and pledge your support early. Notice I did not say donate early, but I definitely solicit pledges starting now.

My health has improved over the past year, so I hope to be able to travel more this next year. If you would like to hear a program on the Texas Lions Foundation, please let me know, and I will do my best to accommodate your club. Unfortunately, eating has gotten to be a habit, so I remain in a "semi-retired" state for a few more years and will make visitations around my work schedule.

From TLERC: Pencils: Check Notebooks: Check Ruler: Check

It's August and this scenario (or something close to it) is being played out all across Texas: Mom or Dad have been to the school or on the school website to get the list of supplies their children will need. Now the frenzy has begun to make sure everything on the list is ready to go on that first day of school.

It may cost a ton of money, but they have to have it. Paper, erasers, pens, notebooks: check. Ruler, protractor, 3 ring binders: check. Gym clothes: check. Folders, thumb drive: check. New pair of jeans, new tennis shoes, new shirts: check. Haircut: check. New lunch box: check. **Eye Exam: NOT CHECKED!**

"We're just out of money; we can't afford the exam much less glasses. I hope their eyes haven't changed much over the summer, plus the school district has to check them anyway".....and so it plays out in households all over the State. As a result, thousands of children will start school with all of the right supplies, but **NOT** all of the right **TOOLS!**

But is leaving it up to the schools the answer? School budgets have been slashed, larger districts that had dedicated testers, probably have cut them. Nursing staffs will be as bare bones as is allowed, so

nurses will find it harder and harder to get the job done accurately. Acuity chart tests, which are minimal exams at best, will be further marginalized due to lack of time.

This year it will be more important than ever for TLERC and Lions Clubs across Texas to step up and serve our children, as the "Knights of the Blind" we are. The great thing is that in the last few years a new device has appeared to bring the screening process into the 21st century. It's called PediaVision.

Once you are trained in its use, PediaVision shoots a computerized picture of an eye so quickly that even a baby's eyes can be checked accurately (almost impossible with old methods). The results are stored in the computer. Now accurate results can be obtained with even the youngest students and at day cares.

More importantly it also detects and records several additional anomalies of the eye, which go undetected using the old screening methods. Conditions, which if caught early enough may be correctable in the child. Doctors use PediaVision in their offices, but have to pay not only for the equipment, but also each time they pull the trigger. However, PediaVision will sell Lions the equipment and

we do not have to pay the \$4-\$5 per image. It is a great tool and can be shared by clubs all across a zone or district.

Of course, once the exams are done there will be thousands of families that can't afford the glasses and once again the Lions of Texas **will** step up to the plate. President Tam believes it. "**I Believe**" it.

Using TLERC's lab we can help you put new glasses on those needy children for \$14/pair (\$18 for some prescriptions). TLERC's Children's Eyeglass Program made 1,000 pair last year. We can do a lot more, and you can serve a lot more through our own State project than using retail outlets. Call TLERC to help your club get going in this important work.

What does the Utopia Lions Club do with the funds it raises each year at the Auction? It helps charities, local community needs, and many organizations. Years ago,

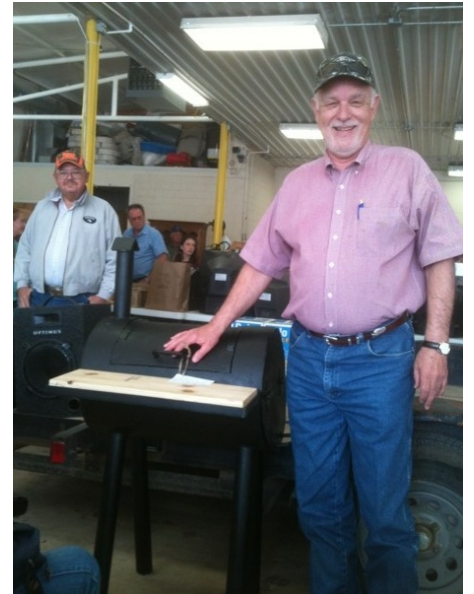

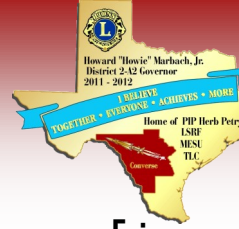
