From The District Governor Richard Keilholz

My Fellow Lions:

When President Madden visited with our Club Presidents during the Council of Governors Meeting in Kerrville, he talked to them about striving for the "Club Excellence Award". As your Governor, I too want to emphasize its importance. The "Club Excellence Award" is really very simple. First, a club needs to be in **good standing** which basically means paying your District, State and International dues on time. Second, **service**; to perform at least three service projects during the Lion Year. Third, **contribute to LCIF**. There is no specific amount required. Lions Recycle Used Hearing Aids

The Lions Clubs in your community are asking people to donate used hearing aids to the Lions Hearing Aid Recycling Program. Perhaps you, a family member or friend may have one or more hearing aids no longer in use.

Lions Clubs collect used hearing aids as part of a unique recycling program. The donated aids will be shipped to a regional Lions Hearing Aid Recycling Center where many will be refurbished for recipients in need. Other aids will be distributed to teams of hearing care professionals and other volunteers for use during health care missions in developing nations.

Hearing impairment and deafness are serious disabilities that can result in learning difficulties for children and

decreased employment opportunities for adults. The poor are especially affected because they are unable to afford the care necessary to prevent hearing loss, and cannot afford to purchase hearing aids.

To donate used hearing aids, carefully wrap them and place them in a Lions hearing aid or eyeglass collection box, located in stores or businesses. If you can not locate a collection box, contact a Lions Club in your area or call the number at the bottom of this letter.

The Lions Clubs are a group of men and women who identify needs within the community and work together to fulfill

those needs.

Lions Clubs International is the world's largest service club organization with nearly 1.3 million members in approximately 45,000 clubs in 208 countries and geographical areas around the world. Since 1917, Lions Clubs have aided the blind and visually impaired and make a strong commitment to community service and serving youth throughout the

Get Informed...Get Involved

In 1982, the leadership of District 2-A2 determined there was a need to create an action agency to oversee and coordinate District Programs and Projects that involved all of the Lions Clubs of 2-A2. The result was the creation of the *District 2-A2 Lions Sight and Tissue Foundation, Inc.* As the name implies, the focus at that time was on eye banking. But, in a few years, the needs of the community changed and other agencies assumed 'tissue' activities. So, in 1989, District leaders reoriented the mission and function of the organization and a new name was adopted to better reflect the role of this important District resource; it became the *Lions Sight Research Foundation of District 2-A2.*

In 2012, the LSRF remains an important and integral part of District Programs, including the **Mobile Eye Screening Unit (MESU)** and the **Lions Low Vision Rehabilitation Center (LLVRC)** located at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio. Space limitations make it impractical to revisit the many accom-

plishments of the last 30 years in this article, but it is beyond question that it has been an eventful and productive period for District 2-A2 and the LSRF.

Now, it is time for the Lions of 2-A2 to assess the future and to decide what comes next for the LSRF; realizing, of course, that District goals drive the agenda of the LSRF. To this end, the Board of Directors of the LSRF, which is elected at the District Convention each year, has undertaken the task of developing a **Strategic Long Range Plan** to outline a path into the future.

As with most 501-c-3 nonprofit corporations, the LSRF has a committee structure in place that serves to divide up projects among designated commit-

tees with specific responsibilities. Given the important task before the Board to develop a comprehensive Strategic Long Range Plan, it has been determined that *there is a real need to recruit non-Directors to serve on LSRF Committees.* Hence, an opportunity has emerged for you to **GET INFORMED** and to **GET INVOLVED.**

The LSRF Constitution establishes the Foundation committee structure.

Below is a brief summary of the LSRF Committees and the important work they are addressing this year. Please take the time to **GET INFORMED.** If you want more information, talk to a LSRF Director or contact the LSRF Office. If you don't have time personally, make the effort to encourage talented Lions in your Club to consider playing a role in planning the future of the Lions Sight Research Foundation of District 2-A2. It's time to **GET INVOLVED.**

The **Executive Committee** oversees all Committees and acts for the full Board between regular meetings. This committee maintains oversight of ongoing LSRF programs and projects. The members of this Committee are the

Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Immediate Past Chair.

The **Finance Committee** monitors the investment program and works with the COO to oversee the fiscal affairs of the Foundation.

The **Long Range Planning Committee** evaluates the interests and needs of the Foundation and is charged with publishing a plan detailing future goals. The Statement of Strategic Objectives that is proposed by the COO and approved by the Board each year provides a basis for developing a formal LRP.

The **Constitution Committee** – Despite a major rewrite of the LSRF Constitution in 2006 and an update in 2010, editorial and cosmetic changes are always needed to insure currency and compatibility with the District Constitution and LCI documents.

The **Nominating Committee** identifies and recruits qualified candidates for LSRF Board service in the future. Candidates for Board Officer positions are identified by this Committee.

The **Stride for Sight - 2013 Committee** will set goals for the 2013 campaign and devise a marketing plan to insure that all activities are coordinated and well supported throughout the District.

The **COO Search Committee** will review and update the Staff Succession Plan that was developed in 2010. A search plan and a selection process will need to be structured and implemented.

The **Community and Public Relations Committee** is charged with designing an outreach program to assist Directors in getting information about the LSRF and District Programs administered by the LSRF to the Lions Community and the public at large.

Southtown Lions Club and University of the Incarnate Word

The Southtown Lions Club has recently partnered with the UIW Eye Institute to provide free vision care and eyeglasses to anyone in need. We will initially be conducting outreach to students in local schools, but they will also accept adult patients we refer.

They are eager to work with any other Lions Club in the same way we've agreed to work together.

Here's how our agreement works:

- Lions Club identifies the patient in need (we'll be partnering with local schools to do this initially).
- Lions Club provides the patient with a voucher.
- Patient contacts UIW Eye Institute to schedule their appointment.
- Patient informs UIW at the time they set the appointment that they will be using a Lions Club Voucher as payment.
- UIW provides eye exam and glasses, charges patient nothing.
- UIW collects vouchers and periodically bills the club for the cost of the eyeglasses only. (We are currently pay-

ing \$35, but they're giving us a bit more of a break because we're a brand new club, might otherwise be \$40 or \$50).

UIW is also poised to help any of these patients with additional vision services and therapies, if needed, also at no cost.

Lions, this is a win-win-win situation. The Eye Institute is a teaching clinic, so their students get the training they need, we get a very low cost option for providing eye-glasses and vision services to the needy in our community, and, of course, these underserved populations get the vision care and eyeglasses they need. It's a great community partnership with tremendous potential. So far, the Institute has

placed no limits on the number of patients they can serve and they're not interested in performing needs testing or doing lots of paperwork. They will rely on us to make sure our referrals are truly needy.

I'm attaching a draft of the voucher we're working up for our club's use. (Subject to revision.)
